HAPPY 55TH ANNIVERSARY

In 1967 when very few Queensland cities and towns had their own historical museums, there was at Redcliffe a group of people who realised the importance of our unique history and the need of recording it. Early that year a delegation comprising Alderman G. Mavor, Mrs W. Hatherell (Marie) and Mr and Mrs J.T. Houghton met at Newstead House with two officers of the 'Royal Queensland Historical Society'. These folk buoyed by the encouragement they received, placed an advertisement in the *Redcliffe Herald* on 8 February 1967 stating that a public meeting would be held at the Redcliffe City Council Chambers at 8pm on Thursday 23 February to discuss the formation of an Historical Society. Twenty-four interested people attended that meeting. The speakers were Jim (James) Houghton Jnr who focused on saving relics and documents pertaining to the First Settlement, George Mavor who expressed concern about the

items lost already and Fabienne Harris who spoke on the value of such a group as a centre to which people might donate treasures.

The Society was formed and the following office-bearers were elected:

President Mr J.T. (James) Houghton

Within a year Redcliffe City Council was approached for a grant of land. Constantly over the decades both parties considered various sites

and the close cooperation of Council has always been a major part of the Society's success story.

By 1970, a museum in a cottage at 143 Sutton Street had opened. Expansion not matched by funds forced the Society to ask Redcliffe City Council for the use of the



disused Bathing Pavilion at Suttons Beach for a museum which was duly occupied by Redcliffe Historical Society from Easter 1975 to 12 April 1998. This was a successful move at the time but the building, erected in 1937, was gradually deteriorating and in 1991 the Society began an earnest drive to have a permanent home. Finally Council/Society discussions resulted in the purchase, in September 1998 of a 1.42 hectare property on which stood the former Sacred Heart Church at 75 Anzac Avenue, Redcliffe. The purchase price was \$1.28 million compared with £66/5/- paid for the vacant corner site (Anzac/Oxley Avenues) in 1897.

HAPPY 55TH ANNIVERSARY (cont.)

The Redcliffe Historical Society played a pivotal role in the establishment of a new Museum for Redcliffe. Firstly it had to convince the majority of its members to step up to the task of accepting a modern museum that would concentrate on people and their stories instead of objects. Public meetings were held early in 1999 and the Society's rights and roles in the Museum partnership were

arranged. A project team including Heather Bradford and John St Pierre was appointed and the Council sponsored a four day study tour of four Southern Museums in March that year. Erica Juster accompanied the Team paying her own

Museum and to Redcliffe Local History Officers upon request.

The Society's work space, "The Den", is behind the Museum building on the western bank of Humpybong Creek. In 1824 a log weir was built – Queensland's first water supply. Appointments may be arranged and History Redcliffe members are welcome to assist with indexing the files, maintaining the Library and assisting people and groups with their particular interests where possible.

The Society's newsletter *Humpybong and After* is published four times a year and its books and souvenirs may be purchased at the Redcliffe Museum or by contacting History Redcliffe.

The past ten years have seen the adoption of a new strategic plan, the operational name *History Redcliffe* with a logo to match (2015), along with an upgraded website, new banner and the marketing of ten finely crafted Medallions leading up to the bicentenary of the First European Settlement in 2024. The first five are *Amity*, Red Cliffs, Redcliffe Jetty, *Koopa* and Anzac Memorial Avenue.

CONFERENCES

In 1987 the first of the annual Small Museums Conferences was held and the Society hosted this first Conference which was held in the Redcliffe CWA Rooms on Sunday 5 April 1987. The 16th South East Queensland Small Museums Conference in 2002 was organised by a committee under the chairmanship of John St Pierre who had played a leading role in the very first Conference of this type 15 years prior. 120 delegates attended the lectures at the Redcliffe Entertainment Centre.

Later this year, History Redcliffe will be hosting the 4th Queensland State Local and Family History Conference, *Sands of Time*. It's shaping up to be another jewel in the crown for the achievements of History Redcliffe.

THOMAS COPSON

THOMAS COPSON b.1852 – d.1929. Land Owner, Farmer, Grave Digger and Community Supporter.

Thomas came to Redcliffe in the 1870s when sugar cane was still being grown here and on 17 December 1877 at the age of about 26, he purchased Portion 165, an area of 26 acres for £26.15.0. It was situated on the south-eastern corner of what is now MacDonnell Road and Elizabeth Avenue across the road from the cemetery reserve. There he built a slab-walled house and farmed his land. He named the property *Coleville*.

Thomas, as the Lessee of Selection No 1958, commenced the ownership process of portions 165, 166, 167 and 172 on 1 July 1873. Detailed costs of erecting a residence, fencing and other necessary additions such as a well are available at the Den. Proof of Fulfilment of Conditions was declared by Thomas Snook and Alex Cameron who stated that Thomas resided continuously on the Selection for eight years seven months—August 1874 to April 1883. A copy of the Certificate of Fulfilment of Conditions

by Selector under “The Crown Lands Alienation Act of 1868” includes the following particulars:

On 7 February 1879, Thomas was one of six local citizens appointed by Order in Council to be trustees of the Redcliffe Cemetery Reserve. He married Annie Cawthorne Wassenage, a local

resident in 1884. Annie was 38 and the wedding was held in the residence of Mr Collins at Sandgate. The ceremony was performed by the Reverend James Voller of the Baptist Church. They lived at Coleville and sadly the son born to them, named Ebenezer, died on 26 March 1885 having lived for only five days.

Thomas played an important part in the progress of the early settlement and successfully tendered for digging graves on 12 January 1895. His tender of seven shillings a grave on week days and ten shillings on Sundays was accepted. He and Annie attended special days at the Humpybong Provincial School which was not very far from their farm.

The Copsons were long term supporters of the Congregational Church and were two signatories of the ‘re-constitution’ of the Church at a service on 2 June 1905*. By this time the Church which was originally built on land adjoining the northern boundary of the Cemetery Reserve c1878, was relocated to land in Oxley Avenue near the previous Fire Station and in 1896 was moved to Brisbane Road (Anzac Avenue) where it remained until after “Church Union” in 1977.

THOMAS COPSON (cont.)

Following the death of Annie, Thomas made a Will on 18 June 1929. He appointed Walter Grant, retired master baker of Redcliffe as his sole executor and trustee. He left legacies to Bridget Haskins, Eliza Williams, a Mrs Moran and to Walter Grant. Other beneficiaries were the 'Salvation Eventide Home for Aged Men' and the Redcliffe Congregational Church. He died from cardiac

failure in the Brisbane Hospital. The minister who officiated at his funeral was the Reverend H J Taudevin of the Redcliffe Congregational Church in Anzac Avenue.


**On 19 May 1905 a total of 27 residents signed a document expressing their desire to form the Congregational Church of Redcliffe.*

RESEARCH REPORT

The most pleasing news this month is the 55th anniversary of the Redcliffe Historical Society/History Redcliffe. A public meeting held at the Redcliffe City Council Chambers on **Thursday 23 February 1967 at 8pm** was chaired by Mr James Houghton, Jnr and attracted a number of interested people. *(See page 3 of this issue for the feature story).*



Work is continuing on assisting Dr Margaret Henry with the background of Churches and their congregations which formed the Redcliffe Uniting Church. Thomas Copson has emerged as an enterprising person in the section on prominent Congregationalists. Pat Gee did an archival search of his land holdings and presented the Den with complete records of Thomas' purchases, explaining the ownership qualifications step by step. *(See story on page 3 this issue).*

Society member and fund-raiser Kath Monteith passed away on 31 December 2021 aged 98 years. Sympathy was extended to her family.

Condolences were offered to the family of the late Robert Michael "Bob" Doocey who passed away on 6 January 2022, a couple of weeks before his 92nd birthday. There are too few known connections of descendants of the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement and Bob was a descendant of Mary Cox who was born here in March 1825. After Mary's first husband died, she married William West and their daughter Emily Ann was an ancestor of Bob's.

From her first marriage, Mary Cox and husband William Maud had a son Samuel Cox Maud and a daughter Hannah Cox Maud. When the 40th Regiment of Foot returned to Australia in 1852, Mary, William (West) and her daughter Hannah lived in Melbourne where Emily was born. (Hannah and Emily were sisters - sharing the same mother, Mary Cox.

In 2018 a great grand- daughter of Hannah's came to Redcliffe and gave copies of documents and a photo of Mary for the Redcliffe Local History Archives.

7TH MEDALLION

Here is your chance to own a little piece of Redcliffe History.

History Redcliffe is happy to announce the release of their 7th limited edition medallion. This medallion depicts “Redcliffe Coat of Arms 1959 - 2008”

“Originally, when it received city status in 1959, the City of Redcliffe obtained its coat of arms including motto and crest. It includes the motto, “A Colonia Condita” meaning “from the beginning of the colony”, marking Redcliffe’s status as the site of the first colonial settlement in Queensland. At the top of the coat of arms is a symbolic image of an Aboriginal law giver.”

In 2014 research and community consultation by History Redcliffe identified ten suitable subjects of Redcliffe historic importance to be displayed on ten medallions with each one released annually from 2015 to 2024. The year 2024 will mark 200 years of European settlement in Queensland at Redcliffe.



Six medallions have been released previously; the first “The Brig Amity 1824” was produced and released in 2015; subsequently “The Red Cliffs 1799” in 2016”, “Redcliffe Jetty 1922” in 2017, “SS Koopa 1911” in 2018, “Redcliffe Anzac Memorial Avenue 1925” in 2019 and “Hornibrook Bridge Portal 1935” in 2020. The medallions are 99% Australian silver designed by local artist Shea Charlish and produced by Perth Mint. Each of the 250 limited edition collectible medallions is issued with a Certificate of Authenticity. This is a great opportunity to collect a Piece of Redcliffe’s historical memorabilia!


