#### RESEARCH REPORT

#### BY MARGARET HARDING

In recent months Rae, Janet and I have provided "Walk/Talks" in Redcliffe's CBD to various groups.

Information on Deception Bay was emailed to a 'new' MBRIT bus tour guide, and written documents were left in the Museum for her to borrow.

Information and photos of the Mullet Boat in the Museum were supplied to staff.

The following notes were emailed to an enquirer regarding the name Redcliff.

#### **Local Government...Snippets**

As per a supplement to the Queensland Government Gazette of 4<sup>th</sup> June 1862, the Proclamation read Redcliff Agricultural Reserve. The Divisional Boards Act of 1879 created divisional boards... 74 of them outside the large municipalities.

The 1880s were the 'land boom' days in Redcliffe when agricultural portions were then termed 'estates'. Many of our land owners lived in Brisbane and after a couple of public meetings, the second one held in Humpybong in 1885 resulted in separation from the Caboolture Division. The sub division included "The Parish of Redcliffe" comprising our older suburbs.

Mr Slaughter says the name "Redcliffe" was in use in official departments by 1878. Evidently the spelling was altered by a government official....an error or intentional?

#### THE STORY BEHIND THE WROUGHT IRON COT

John Garsden and his wife Katherine arrived in NSW c1860 and came to Queensland some time before the end of 1864, where they settled permanently. Two children, Walter and Mary, (who became Mary Burton) were born in New South Wales, and four boys and 2 girls were born in Queensland.

John, while living at East Brisbane, noticed an auction sale of land at Scarborough, and with his youngest child Richard, aged 12, came by boat and purchased portion 241, known as Griffith's Estate, on the south east border of Griffith Road. He erected a wooden holiday house there for the family.

An 1878 map shows that a James Mitchell was the original owner of portions 241, 240, 239 and 230, coastal land at Queens Beach North. Osbourne Street divides portions 241 and 240. Later, John

sold parts of allotments and when Prince Edward Parade was constructed c1921, it crossed Osbourne Street.

The house appears to have been inherited by the eldest daughter Mary Burton (37 perches), hence the name *Burton Cottage*. Richard bought the property from Mary in 1923 for £300 plus £1 per week for a year so thereafter his family had a permanent holiday home, a contrast to the climate in Pratten on the Darling Downs where he was a school teacher. Here the family cot makes its first appearance. Richard and his wife Anne purchased it in 1905/06. Their four sons James, Stan, Clyde and Allan used it.

Association with the land that John Garsden purchased in the 1880s lasted for well over 110 years. Richard continued his teaching career. His last school was Aspley State School in Brisbane where he was Principal. His son Clyde and wife Auriol moved into the house that had been Burton Cottage in 1946, shortly after the end of World War II. They reared three daughters and a son who slept in the cot. Clyde used to commute to his place of employment in Brisbane.

The family lived in the original home until 1973, by which time the house was over 80 years old and was suffering from the effects of termite infestation. Clyde and Auriol built a two-storey brick house (1 Griffith Road) next door and the old house was dismantled. Auriol joined the Redcliffe Historical Society in 1996/1997. After Clyde's death on 27 May 1980 she resided in the family home until 2000, when she moved into a villa at BallyCara Retirement Village. Auriol was born on 14 January 1917 and passed away on 5 September 2009.

Two of Auriol's daughters added to the list make another seven children who used the family

heirloom. After it was restored in 1982 another new regulations stipulated a narrower space three of the fifth generation slept in the cot before between the railings.

Talks with family who donated the Cot to Redcliffe Museum, as mentioned in previous Research Report.

According to *Looking at the Landscape* book written by Pat Gee, John Garsden was one of the best known figures in municipal government in South Brisbane where he was mayor in 1900. He purchased land in Redcliffe in 1888 and had a house at Queens Beach in the early 1900s known as *Burton's Cottage*.

#### DOWN THROUGH THE YEARS

In August 1993, the Redcliffe City Council invited the Redcliffe Historical Society to set up a display for an indefinite period in one of the rooms at the Entertainment Centre. This led to the establishment of *The Gallery* which was opened to the public in December 1993.

On 13 April 1994, at an evening function at the Entertainment Centre, the Society's Gallery was officially opened by the Mayor, Alderman Barry Bolton. On that occasion the Society launched an appeal for public sponsorship of the proposed museum building.

After five months the building fund had reached a total of \$63,425. This included \$40,000 which had been donated by the Redcliffe City Council, \$3000

from the Rotary Club of Redcliffe City and numerous smaller amounts donated by various organisations, schools and individuals.

#### MORETON BAY HISTORY SEMINAR

On Thursday 19th May, Pat Gee , Ann Hanger, Helen Young and myself attended the Moreton Bay History Seminar, held at the Morayfield Sports & Event Centre.

After a moving Welcome to Country by Maroochy Berambah we were introduced to our first speaker of the day - Dr Ray Kerkhove. Ray is currently Historian-in-residence at Sunshine Coast Council. His speciality is 19th century Aboriginal site history and culture of southern Queensland.

We heard of a distinguished Aboriginal Elder called Dalaipi who assisted the Petrie family of pioneers.

Next to the podium was Jan Richardson a PhD candidate at Griffith University. Jan's special interest is non-indigenous ethnic minorities in Queensland before 1860. Jan gave a very interesting presentation describing the harsh conditions of the 15yr Penal Settlement in Queensland, and going into more detail on 2 of the female prisoners.

Dr Margaret Kowald from *Lost Brisbane* then spoke on all the Heritage Listed sites in MBRC area...so

our beloved Redcliffe got a few mentions!

After lunch, we were entertained by Leena Salem and her 2 musicians. Leena gave a wonderful presentation in song and storytelling, of her life. A childhood in Singapore with aspirations to become a star! Leena now calls Australia home and indeed, finished with that very song.

The final presentation of the day was Greg Hallam who works as a historian for Qld Rail. Greg described the Labour Day train disaster from May 1947 at Camp Mountain when a crowded picnic train derailed on a sharp curve while travelling at excessive speed. Unfortunately, Greg was unable to leave his home in Toowoomba (Covid) so his was a Zoom presentation.

During the breaks we were able to visit the other various History societies from our region, which is always interesting.

There was quite a bit of interest in our table also, where we had some books, pamphlets etc on display.

A salute to all Quota ladies...65 years of fundraising to provide assistance to the Redcliffe community.

The Quota Club of Redcliffe celebrates its 65th Anniversary this year and marked the occasion with a large Birthday Cake at its *Craft and Gift Fair* on Saturday, 11<sup>th</sup> June. The Mayor of Moreton Bay Regional Council, Mr Peter Flannery, and Federal member Luke Howarth praised the continued dedication of members.

Now a club of 20 members, compared with 24 at its charter in April 1957, the club has a record of 207 members on its books who have worked hard



to serve the community of Redcliffe for 65 years. Quota's first project in 1958 was a mothers' and babies' rest room at the Jetty Redcliffe entrance, and recent one (2021/22) providing is Soundfield



to Peninsula primary schools which assist hearingimpaired children. Various organisations helped over the years include the Bush Children's Home,

the Blue Nursing Service and Hummingbird House hospice. Other endeavours include the provision of a shelter and barbecue at Woody Point's Quota Place and playing a major part in Margate Bingo for nearly 25 years. After the closure of the Hall in Huntington Court c2007 the ladies graciously availed themselves of the offer by Redcliffe Leagues Club to run raffles there.

Quota gained Gold Benefactor status of the Redcliffe Museum with a donation of \$15000 in 2001 to provide the inaugural educational feature.... *Stepping Stones* that highlighted the history of the schools on the Peninsula. Displays then changed intermittently to focus on an individual school which brought much pride and enjoyment to the school children.

#### 8TH MEDALLION


# Here is your chance to own a little piece of Redcliffe History.

This year History Redcliffe are releasing the 8th limited edition medallion depicting "Sammy Bell". Memorial - 1913.

Boama or Sammy Bell as he became known was adored by locals and supported himself by getting oysters and crabs for residents and visitors and could be seen amusing visitors with well known songs and dances for pennies at Woody Point Jetty. His Memorial Stone, pictured below was paid for by local residents!

In 2014 research and community consultation by History Redcliffe identified ten suitable subjects of Redcliffe historic importance to be

displayed on ten medallions with each one released annually from 2015 to 2024. The year 2024 will mark 200 years of European settlement in Queensland at Redcliffe.



Seven medallions have been released previously; the first "The Brig Amity 1824" was produced and released in 2015; subsequently "The Red Cliffs 1799" in 2016", "Redcliffe Jetty 1922" in 2017, "SS Koopa 1911" in 2018, "Redcliffe Anzac Memorial Avenue 1925" in 2019, "Hornibrook Bridge Portal 1935" in 2020 and "Redcliffe Coat of Arms 1959-2008".

The medallions are 99% Australian silver designed by local artist Shea Charlish and produced by Perth Mint. Each of the 250 limited edition collectible medallions is issued with a Certificate of Authenticity. This is a great opportunity to collect a Piece of Redcliffe's historical memorabilia!




