



For the occasion, History Redcliffe formed a table, being one of seventeen tables of ten. We enjoyed the camaraderie of women from the Redcliffe community and some senior girls from several high schools. We had bacon and eggs with tea and coffee. The Federal Member for Petrie, Hon. Luke Howarth, sent a basket for a lucky door prize and so did the State Member for Redcliffe, the Hon. Yvette D'Ath. Councillor Sandra Ruck

attended and gave a brief speech. The guest speaker was Ms Beris Pritchard OAM, a long-standing member of Redcliffe Quota. She spoke on her years of service with the club gaining leadership experience along the way which led to her becoming international president in 1988/89. Her speech was very inspiring to all of us.

The Quota Club of Redcliffe was chartered in 1957. It is a women's service club of twenty- two members which supports numerous causes. These include the Cartmill Riding for the Disabled, Chameleon House, Hummingbird House, Jill House, the Breakfast Club, Meals on Wheels, victims of domestic violence, the homeless and the Helping Hands Network. Funds are raised for them through the annual IWD Breakfast and the Craft and Gift Fairs. It also runs a Trivia Night in June, a fashion parade in October and a Christmas raffle in

November/December. Quota also helps schools to install Soundfield Systems in classrooms to assist deaf and hard of hearing students whilst also helping all students to hear and teachers to save their voices. As well, it is involved with QuoCKa reading at primary schools (also known as Quota, Cops and Kids reading together) programmes.


The Quota Club of Redcliffe used to be part of Quota International, an international service organisation which disbanded in 2020 due to falling memberships. It was

founded in Buffalo, New York, in 1919 by Wanda Frey Joiner who served as first international president. The charter was to provide basic needs for women, children, the deaf and hard of hearing communities around the world.

International Women's Day grew out of efforts in the early twentieth century to promote women's rights. Purple, green and white are the colours of IWD: purple for justice and dignity, green for hope and white for purity. IWD has become a global day celebrating the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. It also marks a call to action for accelerating gender parity.

Since 1996, Redcliffe Quota has been hosting IWD breakfasts which are eagerly looked forward to by local women for the very talented guest speakers and their interesting and informative topics and the valuable networking opportunities afforded at these functions.

Beris Pritchard will be the guest speaker at the History Redcliffe monthly meeting on 7th July, 2023 to be held in the Redcliffe Library Meeting Room.



## A Tribute to Ken Peters 1935 - 2023

Long-time Queensland motorsport and photography identity, Ken Peters, passed away peacefully on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> March aged 87 years, after a short illness. He was married for 61 years to Narelle Peters who died in December 2021. Both spent all of their married life working and living in Redcliffe.

Soon after national service in 1955, where Ken was a champion marksman. Ken with his brothers Jim, Trevor and Ian got involved in motorsport. He joined the Queensland Motor Sporting Club (QMSC) in 1956 and was soon on the committee. He won the Qld Motorkana championship in 1963 and was the president of QMSC from 1961 – 1966. QMSC was largely responsible for working with Lakeside landowner, Sid Sakzewski, to get Lakeside built and then promote it with huge success, resulting in international drivers attending Lakeside for huge events including 2 x Australian Grands Prix featuring drivers such as Jim Clarke, Jackie Stewart, Graham Hill, Chris Amon and, of course, Jack Brabham.

Ken went onto to be the Clerk of the Course in the early

years of Lakeside, whilst also doing some circuit announcing at Lakeside, Lowood and Surfers Paradise. After many years not driving, he dabbled in hill climbs and competed at the first Mt Cotton event before eventually getting into sports car racing. Two of his achievements memorable were winning the Queensland Racing Champion in 1974 (across categories and the following year in 1975 won by Dick Johnson). In 1981 Ken won the Lakeside round of the Australian Sports Car championship in his Auscam 600M which was designed and built by his younger brother lan, builder of many Auscam race cars.

Ken was also a qualified pharmacist, as was Narelle, but spent most of his working life in the photographic industry which started because of his love of photography, winning distinguished awards, sitting on boards and was president of the Australian Photographic Dealers Association where he formed a link to the PMA International. Ken's pharmacy and subsequent camera store was a feature on Redcliffe Parade for nearly 50 years.

Ken and Narelle travelled throughout their working life and retirement, with many of their trips photographed and the images hung in the Redcliffe gallery, and a couple, Antarctica and the Amazon, spending time in galleries around Queensland and NSW.

Ken was a past president of the Kippa-Ring Rotary Club, awarded a Paul Harris Fellowship and was Redcliffe Citizen of the year in 2005. Ken was also a life member of the Peninsula Camera Club, Redcliffe Show Society and the Mousetrap Theatre.

Ken is survived by son Brett and daughter Fiona and their families.

#### Vale Ken Peters

As Ken once pointed out, "I suppose it is important to remember that I was a 'clubman' driver who had some success in the South. With my Pharmacy, home life and camera industry activities I had limited time to really get serious and never contemplated being 'professional.' Also we always operated on a tight budget even with the corporate support from the camera industry." He learnt spraypainting from Redcliffe's Bill Rankin and sheet metal work from Ralph Ruiter.

Ken raced numerous road cars and three specialist race cars: a Lotus Super 7, the Welsor Clubman with a Ford 1600cc engine which completed 39 of 42 races entered and was in a podium position in its class on most occasions, and the Auscam 600M sponsored by Tamron of Japan. (See image on page 4)

The trophy – a bronze 64cm bronze statuette stylized racing driver holding his helmet above his head was created by Paul Jones a Queensland Motor Sports Club committee member and an advertising executive. It was cast by jeweller Wallace Bishop. When QMSC folded, Ken was offered the trophy. Queensland Motor Racing icon, Dick Johnson won the trophy in 1975 and 1976.

## Our Day at Bankfoot House

Seventeen members and friends gathered outside of the Redcliffe Museum on Friday, 14th April, 2023 and boarded the bus driven by Ian, the bus driver. We were

given a very warm welcome by Claudia Little and James Abernethy who used to work at the Redcliffe Museum.

Built in 1868, Bankfoot House is located at what is now 1998 Old Gympie Road, Glass House Mountains. Overlooking the property is the magnificent Mount Tibrogargan.

The retired Professor Greenwood from the University of the Sunshine Coast and now a very enthusiastic

volunteer, has extensively researched the Scottish Grigor family who lived in the house for 3 generations. His talk, illustrated by a power point presentation, was very informative and detailed. Bankfoot was the name of the village Mary Grigor came from. She was married to William and together they built the house, raised a large family, managed a farm and a Cobb and Co staging post, which provided accommodation and meals, between Brisbane and the Gympie goldfields. William was also the local postmaster.



The Bankfoot House Heritage Precinct includes the house museum with family memorabilia, the shed with a display of tools, the dairy with the cream separator and butter churner, the laundry with old equipment,

and the Mary Grigor Research Centre. The centre contains a very large collection of catalogued documents and objects which belonged to the family, the region's First Nations app which showed Aboriginal life and customs, heritage films, and special

exhibitions and maps. Dotted with large old trees, the spacious grounds make a lovely setting for family picnics and First Nations gatherings.



The History Redcliffe day trippers thoroughly recommend the visit and the precinct is open for free from Wednesday to Sunday, 10 am-3 pm. (Closed public holidays). It is worth having a guided tour through the house as you will hear all sorts of interesting stories and see long forgotten objects that made a house into a home in the early days.

## **Moreton Bay History Seminar**

It was held at the Morayfield Sports and Event Centre at Morayfield on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> May, 2023.

The venue was very spacious and comfortably housed the local history groups' stalls around the perimeter of the hall and the attendees arranged themselves in the middle facing the stage.

The first speaker was Stephanie Ryan, Research Librarian from the State Library of Queensland. She gave a very interesting account of the investigative research required to prove that Amity Moreton Thompson was indeed the first European child born at Humpybong, Redcliffe Peninsula on 21st September, 1824. The State Library of Queensland holds a copy of her original birth registration on microfilm. Many databases were used in the search for her life details.


The second speaker was Dr. Darren O'Brien, Honorary Senior Research Fellow of the School of Historical and Philosophical Inquiry, University of Queensland. He is President of the Australian Institute for Holocaust and Genocide Studies and the Director of the Australian Stumbling Stones project. He gave a paper on 'Who was Harry Pring?' In August 1862, an Aboriginal man known as Harry Pring was murdered with 7 other indigenous people at Caboolture, by native police, in an unprovoked attack. The story appears in The Courier, Brisbane, on Saturday 4th October 1862. It can be found in Trove. Dr O'Brien, in collaboration with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island individuals, descendants and organisations, remembers ATSI victims, survivors and resistors of British and Australian destruction by installing commemorative brass plaques in the pavement or country, where each person last lived. He has placed a number of these stones at designated sites.

Brief talks were delivered by 4 speakers from the Moreton Bay region. They included Pat Gee from the Redcliffe Historical Society. It was founded in 1967 and research on people, buildings, and suburbs has been ongoing. The bicentenary of the first European landing will be acknowledged next year. The second speaker was Lynne Hooper who described the amazing life of Sarah Balls, a Brisbane entrepreneur who built a fish cannery on Bribie Island in 1908. Then we heard Donna Grigor from the Woodford Historical Society speak about the vicissitudes of the small schools that dotted the landscape in times past. Finally, we heard Sue Battersby from Caboolture Family History. She described a very ambitious project to research 35 to 50 families who lived in the area between 1860 and 1880. Volunteers are needed!

The day inspired everyone to think deeply about our Moreton Bay history and to locate and preserve all documentation pertaining to it.

## Sir David Eric Nicholson

David was born in the Mikimiki Valley in New Zealand's North Island on 26<sup>th</sup> May 1904, first born of twin sons to John Albert and Marcia Mary Nicholson.

David came to Sydney in 1925 where he obtained employment with a bicycle manufacturing company as a mechanic and professional rider having gained a reputation throughout the district in foot races and bike riding. During a performance at the Brisbane Exhibition in 1934, David decided to propose to his loved one in Sydney. Cecile Floyd Smith, a young dental nurse, accepted his telephone proposal, came to Brisbane and they married on 4<sup>th</sup> August 1934 at South Brisbane.

Turning his attention to the practical world of business David's expertise as radio and refrigeration mechanic earned him a place in the fledgling business of Mr J. B. (later Sir John) Chandler. He acquired an old Overlander 90 Ute for £10, got it into ship shape order and took to the road selling and servicing and maintaining radios and electrical appliances. During this time, he chose to set up a permanent business in Caboolture. The cricket test broadcasts of the 1930s boosted the popularity of radios enormously. They sold like hot cakes and contributed largely to the success of the business. During World War II he was drafted to work with essential wartime radio and electrical services.

David who had developed an interest in the political scene even in his youthful days in New Zealand sought and was successful in obtaining Country Party endorsement for the State seat of Murrumba in 1950 and came to Redcliffe in 1954. He was appointed Speaker of the House in 1960. He remained Speaker until his resignation in 1972 completing a record term

for that office in the state of Queensland. That year David was created Knight Bachelor for outstanding service to the State, the Country, and to Parliament in particular.



David was widowed

on 25<sup>th</sup> November 1987 losing his loved one and soulmate after 53 years of marriage. He spent his final years at Bribie Island Retirement Village where he was loved by all. He died 13<sup>th</sup> December 1997. He is survived by his four children, David, Bruce, Helen and Merrilyn.

He was a member of the Redcliffe Peninsula Chamber of Commerce and Spastic Welfare Committee Redcliffe and was President of the Redcliffe Show Society. He was patron of the Caboolture Ex-Servicemen's Club, life member of the Redcliffe Trotting Club. After the inauguration of the Redcliffe Historical Society in 1967 David was a trustee until 1972. He was a member of the state executive Queensland Ambulance Transport Brigade (QATB). He was a member of the Royal National Association (RNA). He was a member of the Queensland Builders Registration Board and Picture Theatre and Film Commission.


