

Another notable event in October was the 'Sands of Time local and Family History Conference' held at the Redcliffe Leagues Club. Despite the wet weather, it was a very successful, well attended conference. There was a tremendous amount of hard work put into this conference and I'd like to again thank the organising committee for their efforts.

November exposed us to the author Vivienne Harris and her beautifully written and illustrated book on Cribb Island.

In December, we once again enjoyed the hospitality of Redcliffe Museum for a Christmas afternoon tea.

The guest speaker in February was Elizabeth Nunn who spoke on Edward Yaldwyn, the first recipient of the Albert Medal. Edward was a modest man from western Queensland. It was wonderful to hear of his heroic actions and to play a small part in his memory being kept alive.

The March meeting had us all buzzing as we heard all about European honeybees from Shamus Leathart.

The April meeting (held in late March) was a delight when we met Tricia Reust, a well-known Redcliffe artist.

Graham Gibb our guest speaker in May spoke on his volunteer work with Marine Rescue and Police on Bribie Island.

In June we enjoyed a members' lunch at Redcliffe Tavern. This was a great opportunity for us to catch up, mingle and get to know each other.



#### Maria Roberston 1822-1904

Born at Southampton in England in 1822, Maria Robertson had come to Australia at an early age and had married Frederick Hayes at Windsor NSW in 1839. He died young, leaving Maria with a family of small children, and for many years afterwards she lived in the Sydney suburb of Petersham.

After enduring the loss of another husband and two children, Maria aged 59 years married Thomas Robertson a retired grazier in 1881 at Petersham. They moved soon afterwards to Redcliffe and in 1883 Thomas purchased a large allotment near the beach at Margate.

There they built a spacious house and named it "Ferny Lawn". One of the first houses near Margate beach, it was Maria's home for the rest of her life. A private jetty which Thomas constructed at Margate Beach became a well-known landmark known as Robertson's Jetty. To the Peninsula came also Maria's unmarried daughter Maria Emily Hayes, and her son, William George Hayes.

Maria soon became prominent in several movements to promote the progress of the Peninsula. Thomas died in



June 1889, sadly only having spent six years at Ferny Lawn. Maria's interest in the local community continued. A devout Anglican, she gave her support to the efforts being made towards the erection of a church on land in Sutton Street. She shared the joy of her fellow Anglicans when the church was completed in 1898.

Maria passed away on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1904 aged 81.

#### In the Papers...

Moreton Mail, Saturday 24th July, 1886, p3.

This being the winter season I have not had much news for you lately, as things have been very quiet. Still, building is going on in several localities, and there seems to be an air of more solid prosperity about the place than heretofore. A very fine residence has been erected on the property lately known as Skinner's for Mr. T. Robertson, of Hill End, South Brisbane. This is nearly completed, and when finished it will be one of the best houses here. Dr. C. F. Marks has bought Dr. Hobbs' old cottage, and is making great improvements there. The fact of a medical man having chosen this place for his sea-side residence speaks well for its health-giving properties.

The road party have been lately occupied in clearing and forming a road from Redcliffe Point to the public offices, including a crossing over Humpybong Creek. This last

was greatly needed, as it saves a round of fully a mile. There is plenty of work ahead for them. Our roads are nothing more nor less, at present, than quaking bogs; until we get divisional separation I fear there will be no improvement.

Your article re steam communication between the peninsula and Sandgate was read with great interest and was fully appreciated. We are waiting patiently for the resumption of steam traffic to Sandgate to restore this place to the prosperity it formerly enjoyed during the running of the steam ferry. Surely it would pay the Pier Company better to allow the steamers to call for a nominal sum, charging pier fees to the passengers and visitors who would come on to see the steamer, than have it lying in its present idle condition. We have had plenty of rain, all the waterholes being full, and feed, considering the time of year, is most abundant.

A story about the Memorial to Women of WWII was of interest to a family with involvement in the Time Capsule buried at this site in Anzac Place.


Members of the Research Group prepared stories and photos of early settlers for a Heritage Day at the Caboolture Historical Village. The First Settlement Wall was also included.

5<sup>th</sup> July: the subject matter of Pierre's Mill and Dutch Immigration was an enquiry through the Library and Museum. Information from an interview in 2014 was forwarded to a film maker in The Netherlands and contact was renewed with the 2<sup>nd</sup> generation of the family.

We invite guests to enjoy refreshments in the main exhibition space throughout the evening.


