

Frawley College Jubilee

Earlier this year, I was delighted to the 50th Anniversary celebration of my alma mater, Frawley College. The college, along with the other Catholic schools on the Peninsula (Our Lady of Lourdes, St Bernadettes, Soubirous College, and De La Salle College) were amalgamated and since 1995 have been known as Southern Cross Catholic College. Frawley College was established in 1973 as a senior college, educating students in grades 11 and 12 only. As such, it was a school that granted permissions that would have been unheard of in other schools, notably a designated smoking area for students. One of my favourite memories is actually from the 1991 yearbook when one of my classmates when asked for our 10 predictions stated "this school will have a drinking shed next to the smoking shed"! We weren't to know at that time that the school would only last another 3 years after that.

The 50th anniversary celebration was held at Mon Komo and was organised by former Deputy Principal Paul Dickie and one of Frawley's favourite old boys, Rupert McCall. To the great delight of all who attended Rupert treated us to a poem in honour of the occasion. I'm pleased to be able to share this with you here with Rupert's permission.

Blue Water Square Event

To celebrate the 15th anniversary of Bluewater Square shopping centre, History Redcliffe was invited to lead a free public event. The event was held in the centre's community space, Bluewater Gardens on Thursday 14th September. On the theme of "Water", there were to be displays of historical photos and books, and opportunities for shared stories, with active participation by attendees,

followed by a trivia competition. Margaret Harding did a lot of work selecting suitable photos, including the printing of four selected images to be displayed on easels. She also chose brochures, books and articles that attendees would be encouraged to peruse.

With preparation completed, on the day it was rather disappointing to find only a small number of visitors present. However those who did attend were very enthusiastic to be there. History Redcliffe was represented by Margaret Harding, Pat Gee and myself. Three committee members from Nundah and Districts Historical Society were present at the event, having seen notice of a Trivia Morning in a recent HR newsletter.

After introductions, Margaret began by speaking of the significance of the 1824 arrival by sea, and convict settlement at Redcliffe, leading on to the founding of the Brisbane site and in 1859, the proclamation of the state of Queensland. Shipping was the only means of transport to the area for many decades, playing a huge part in the exploration of the region. Margaret pointed



out the large historical photos on display: people arriving by passenger boats for day trips, walking along the

foreshore near the original jetty, families enjoying beach picnics and local children frolicking around dinghies. Some of the visitors expressed surprise at some of the historical facts presented. The word "Humpybong" remains a mystery to many, although some who attended Queensland primary schools in the

'50s and '60s probably had the facts drummed into them! Today, Moreton Bay continues to be extremely popular with residents and visitors for recreational and business activities such as swimming, boating, sailing, fishing and whale watching, as well as just strolling on the jetties and foreshores of Redcliffe Peninsula, relaxing close to water, and the sea air.

The trivia quiz proved very popular and sparked more discussion about old and

new Redcliffe, as well as a lot of laughter. Those present had their own stories, memories of visits and

holidays at Redcliffe. They noted how times had changed, with school holidays of past decades spent in beach-side tents



now replaced with modern apartment accommodation and day trips to Sunday markets, restaurants, sporting venues and special events. Many now arrive on the Peninsula by driving over water via the twin bridges, rather than coming by water.

By prior arrangement with Margaret, the Nundah attendees went on a tour with her and Ian after a break for lunch. They visited the Matthew Flinders memorial and the seat made from the timbers of Hornibrook Bridge, the first bridge to Redcliffe. Ian then showed them around the Museum, where they bought several books. Comment was made about HR'S favorable relationship with City of Moreton Bay Council and the Society's enviable access to, and use of our working space, The Den.

In the following days, History Redcliffe received letters of thanks and we also received a donation \$200 by Bluewater Square Centre Management as an expression of gratitude.

An overall successful event for History Redcliffe.

Sunday, 11 February 2024 | 11:00 AM to 02:00 PM


Use a sewing machine to make a towel poncho to wear at the beach. Local artist Jennis Ardern will guide you through this beginners sewing workshop.

Redcliffe Hospital Auxiliary

How this Organisation first started...

Two sisters Eve Warner and Elizabeth Rudd together with Kath Hannard as Secretary commenced the Auxiliary on 8th July 1971 with 17 Founding Members and by the end of 1971 membership increased to 29 with a 50cents annual fee. Membership increased over the years and in 1989/90 there were 85 members, being the highest membership during the past 50 years. Rebecca Beck (Betty) who migrated to Australia in 1980

joined the Group in 1981. She won a Raffle at the Annual Fete in June 1981 and collected this the next morning. She was amazed at all the Auxiliary Ladies (who were not young then) clearing up the grounds following the Saturday Fete. She was asked to join and was a member for 36 years until she was 97 and worked

in the Workrooms every Wednesday Morning until she was 97 years young. She sadly passed away in September 2018. I personally came to Redcliffe in 1978 after migrating from the UK. We found accommodation near to Hospital,

Schools and local shopping Centres. The fact that I noticed the name of BECK STREET locally made us decide to make Redcliffe our Home. My parents arrived

in 1980. I became involved in the Redcliffe Hospital Auxiliary as I would drop Betty off before I went to work and became involved in Cake stalls and fundraising over the years.

In 1982 the Auxiliary commenced fund raising to build the Chapel (our largest project.) Donations were provided by Auxiliary members and the local community. As part of the donation process you were able to nominate what you would like your donation to fund, for example, bricks, lectern, chapel furniture, prayer table, cross, pews, font, altar and stained glass windows. The pews all have the names of the families that donated them, which included my parents, Rebecca and Maurice Beck and my husband and myself. The Auxiliary hosted a number of fundraising dinner We also sought interest free loans from parties. Auxiliary Members and local community totalling \$8.000.

All loans were repaid by July 1985 by the Auxiliary. This Chapel was officially opened on 2nd February 1986. The total cost of the Chapel was \$60.659.64.

I joined in 1988 although still employed and helped out at fetes and cake stalls, then became a full-time member in 2002 when I retired.

Our Auxiliary accommodation for our work mornings has changed over the years and our current location in North Block being our 5th move. The Auxiliary (the only volunteers at that time) used to undertake a lot more general tasks in the earlier days, for example, visiting the wards, reading to patients, flower arranging, and Office Work. From 1992 to December 2010 the Auxiliary manned the front foyer desk assisting patients and visitors to the facility, which now of course is looked after by the Volunteer Coordinator and her Volunteer "Red Shirts". The Auxiliary became an incorporated

body and we undertake more fundraising.

We provided funding for the Healing Garden for A.T.S.I. at the entrance to The Hospital and also for the Garden of Reflection outside

the Chapel. Over the years the size and cost of the donations has steadily increased significantly thanks to the tireless fundraising activities of the Auxiliary.



We provided a state-of-the-art baby warmer to the Maternity Ward. Other wards that have benefitted are Palliative Care, Rehab Unit, Oncology, Renal and the Children's Ward plus The Lodge (where families stay whilst their loved ones are in hospital). This was totally refurbished via our fundraising - TVs in all the bedrooms, complete new bathroom, flooring, blinds. Families can stay at no cost, but frequently donate towards their stay. We also provided the funds together with the Freemasons for a Bereavement Room in Maternity which opened in 2022.

Changes since 2011

At the present time we have 26 Members with an average age of 72.5. The Redcliffe Hospital Auxiliary Inc. gift shop which opened in July 2011 is the primary source of fundraising for our not-for-profit group. The funds raised from the sale of the items donated are utilised in the support of the Redcliffe Hospital patients and visitors. The Auxiliary gift shop has a permanent and strategic location in the Redcliffe Hospital which operates on a daily basis. From 1971 to June 2011 we raised \$539,288.58 and from July 2011 up to June 2021 the sum of: \$315,478.00 making a total sum from 1971 - 2022 of: \$854,766.58. Technology has changed and we provide tablets, DVDs and players to Social Worker Sections to enable patients to use whilst in hospital.

We have our Wednesday Morning Work Session from 7am – 10.30am where we undertake a variety of tasks to provide support for the Wards and Admin Sections. Covid affected our fundraising with lock downs for volunteers in 2020/2021.

Purchasing items for the Hospital

We have three stalls annually at Peninsula Fair (at no cost for Charities) from 8am to 5pm. It proved to be very popular and financially we raise much needed funds for the Auxiliary. More recently we have Plant Stalls twice yearly at the front of the Hospital which have proved very successful financially.

When we were unable to attend volunteering, we were able to keep in touch by having outdoor BBQs at local parks when allowed, wearing masks and social distancing.

We liaise with local groups and individuals who provide us with items such as craftwork, knitting, sewing crochet work, flower displays, toys as well as recycled We have a good relationship with local books. playgroups and provide them with cards so they can make pictures as well as other items they might need. We do not waste anything that could benefit other organisations.

In recent years we have applied to Moreton Bay Regional Council for Grants and also plan applying for a Gaming Grant for future projects at Redcliffe Hospital which will be aimed at improving patients stay whilst they are in Hospital. The last three years we have worked with Management in arranging a Reddy Fun Run and use technology for people to register and donate. All funds raised are provided to the Redcliffe Hospital Auxiliary. We receive donations from the Ladies Bowls Club annually and many patients/visitors donate at the Coffee Shops or Gift Shops showing their appreciation for their stay whilst in Hospital.

Liz's commitment is inspired by her Mother's long contribution to the Redcliffe Hospital Auxiliary. She stepped into the role of President in 2009, 2010 and 2011. Liz is the current President having served continuously since 2018.

Three Milks Cake

Ingredients (

- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 tbs vanilla extract
- 200g caster sugar
- 1 cup (150g) self-raising flour, sifted
- 1 tsp baking powder

- ½ cup (125ml) evaporated milk
- ½ cup (125ml) condensed milk
- ½ cup (125ml) full-cream milk
- 200ml thickened cream, whisked to soft peaks
- blueberries or raspberries to serve.

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 150 degrees C.
- 2. Grease and line base and side of a 20cm springform cake pan.
- 3. Using an electric mixer, whisk egg whites on low speed for 1 minute or until frothy.
- 4. Add egg yolks and beat on medium speed for 1 minute.
- 5. Add vanilla and sugar, and beat for 1 minute.
- 6. Add flour and baking powder, and beat for a further 1 minute or until just combined.
- 7. Transfer batter to cake pan, gently smoothing the surface, then bake for 35-40 minutes until golden.
- 8. Cool cake in pan for 15-20 minutes, then turn out onto a serving plate with a rim.
- 9. Meanwhile, combine the 3 milks in a jug, then slowly pour milk mixture over the cake, allowing it to soak in.

Serve slices of cake topped with dollops of whipped cream and berries.

Serves 6.
